FOREWORD

THE English version of the Universal Decimal Classification (UDC) is being prepared and published as BS 1000 by the British Standards Institution (BSI) at the original joint request of the British Society for International Bibliography (BSIB) and the Association of Special Libraries and Information Bureaux (ASLIB), now both amalgamated as Aslib. The first English full edition is the fourth international edition authorized by the Félération Internationale de Documentation (FID) and has the approval of the Education Foundation, Lake Placid Club, New York, proprietors of the Dewey Decimal Classification, from which the UDC derives.

This section is part of the English full edition and existing and prospective users are strongly advised not to use it in isolation but in conjunction with the Abridged English Edition, BS 1000A. The abridged edition refers to many other subjects of interest to users which are not listed in this schedule and it provides a conspectus of the whole scheme, together with an introduction to its use. For further practical information about the principles, application and utilization of the scheme, users should refer to BS 1000C 'Guide to the Universal Decimal Classification (UDC)'. A survey of UDC editions in English and other languages will be found on page 18 of this volume.

Because the BSI is making every effort to complete the first English full edition of the UDC by publishing without delay those parts of BS 1000 which are lacking, it is possible that some errors, imperfections and inconsistencies will be found in this section. The Institution would like to emphasize however that every user has the opportunity to submit suggestions for improvements; these will be welcomed and considered by the appropriate bodies. Improve-ments involving major changes in the order and arrangement of the classification can only be introduced by international agreement (via the British Standards Institution) but criticisms of terminology, translation, etc., affecting the English edition as such can be dealt with by the BSI.

This edition of UDC 159.9 Psychology incorporates amendments from 'Extensions and Corrections to the UDC' up to and including Series 6, No. 5.

NOTES ON AUXILIARY SIGNS AND SUBDIVISIONS*

Colon sign of relation. To prevent scattering of information on important recurrent concepts and for general ease of cross reference, maximum use of the colon (rather than auxiliary numbers) is recommended, especially for published abstracts, bibliographies or other documents with a wide circulation.

This necessitates a longer notation however, and for libraries or private collections with adequate alphabetical subject indexes, the use of suitable auxiliary numbers, where available, may provide a simpler and more convenient solution.

Common auxiliaries. The common subdivisions of language =, form (0...), place (1/9), time '...', and point of view ...00..., given in the tables of auxiliary numbers and symbols are all applicable throughout the whole of section 159.9, but should only be used to express concepts not otherwise provided for in the schedule.

Special auxiliaries. The special auxiliary subdivisions -05, listed at 616 are applicable throughout 159.9, but should only be used to express concepts not already provided in the ordinary divisions of 159.9.

It is preferable to use the special auxiliary subdivisions .01/.076.8 with the main number 159.9 only, but they may be used throughout 159.9 when required.

EXPLANATION OF OTHER SYMBOLS USED IN THE SCHEDULE

The arrow \rightarrow is used to mean either 'see' or 'see also' according to the context and form of reference, e.g. under 159.937.53 'Perception of time (duration) and rhythm' there is the reference ' \rightarrow 115 Time (philosophical, metaphysical)'. In this instance \rightarrow indicates 'see' and is an endeavour to draw the user's attention to a subject with affinities to 159.937.53, but seen from the philosophical point of view.

The symbol \cong is used to mean 'subdivide as' and indicates that the number preceding it may be further subdivided in the same way as, and with meanings analogous to, the subdivisions of the number which follow it, e.g. 159 922 23 \approx 159 93 means that the subdivisions 159.922.230/.238 are obtained from the subdivisions of 159.930/.938, instead of listing them in full under 159.922.23.

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P NOTES AND EXTENSIONS TO THE UDC

P Notes are lists of proposed extensions, modifications and corrections to the UDC and are issued by the International Federation for Documentation (FID) as working documents for circulation to active participants in the development and revision of the UDC. They appear irregularly with text variously in English, French or German.

Extensions and corrections to the UDC (FID No. 248) are one of the most authoritative services to users of the UDC and take the form of half-yearly lists consisting of all P Notes, issued within a previous six month period, which have been authorized. Each issue incorporates and supersedes the preceding one(s) in the same series, a series comprising six issues and covering a period of three The contents are arranged cumulatively in order of UDC vears. number, i.e. beginning with the common auxiliaries and ending with the final subdivisions of class 9, with text variously in English, French or German.

Copies of the final issues (No. 6) of earlier series are still obtainable as follows:

Ser. 1: No. 6 (Feb. 1954) for period Aug. 1949-Dec. 1952 (P Notes 411-520).

- Ser. 2: No. 6 (July 1956) for period Jan. 1953-Dec. 1955 (P Notes 521-597).
- Ser. 3: No. 6 (July 1959) for period Jan. 1956-Dec. 1958 (P Notes 598-658).
- Ser. 4: No. 6 (Aug. 1962) for period Jan. 1959-Dec. 1961 (P Notes 659-764).
- Ser. 5: No. 6 (Sep. 1965) for period Jan. 1962-Dec. 1964 (P Notes 765-826).

The latest issue is:

Ser. 6: No. 4 (Sep. 1967) for period Jan. 1965-June 1967 (P Notes 827-874).

The above series enable users to update their editions of the UDC but oblige them to purchase the Extensions to all classes of the UDC even though they may have only special subject interests.

The recently published FID No. 420 Cumulated UDC Supplement (1964) will partially meet the requirements of users with limited special subject interests. It includes all the matter from the first five series of the Extensions and corrections to the UDC, i.e. P Notes up to P826, December, 1964, together with that from the Ergänzungen (1951) supplementing the German full edition completed in 1948, intercalated and cumulated in six separate volumes for the following classes, divisions and sections of the UDC, with text variously in English, French or German:

Vol. I: UDC 0/3; Vol. II: UDC 5/61; Vol. III: UDC 62/621; Vol. IV: UDC 622/65; Vol. V: UDC 66/68; Vol. VI: UDC 69/9 and common auxiliaries.

It will be appreciated that the users with general subject interests will still need the Extensions and corrections to the UDC, whilst even those with special subject interests will need the latest issue of Series 6 if they wish to keep up to date as it is not proposed to issue a further Cumulated UDC Supplement in the near future.





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
