REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

on the working of the

Indian Council of World Affairs

to the Tenth Annual General Meeting for the year ending 31 December 1953

THE PROGRAMME OF STUDIES

International Affairs (General)

1. Indians in South Africa: This study by Miss R. C. Manchester covers the history of Indians in South Africa from 1860 to the present day. Besides studying the economic, political and social life of Indians as a community and their achievements in spite of their sufferings under the colour bar, Miss Manchester also investigates their relations with other non-European Groups. The part played by the Government of India and the Government of the United Kingdom and the United Nations in the solution of the problems which have arisen from time to time as well as the various resistance movements are also dealt with. The monograph is still in the course of preparation.

Asian Problems

- 2. The Structure of Asia's Economy: This study seeks to analyse the economies of Asian countries with a view to studying their mutual relationship and in particular to see how far they can be considered as complementary to one another. A full-time Research Associate was especially appointed for a period of 6 months thring the year to enable Dr. V. K. R. V. Rao to complete the collection of all the material for the work. Dr. V. K. R. V. Rao has not been able, on account of his various pre-occupations, including work connected with the Taxation Enquiry Commission, to complete the analysis of the material already collected. The study is not expected to be completed before the middle of 1955.
- 3. Security and Defence Problems of India, Southern Asia and The Indian Ocean Region: During the year four chapters of this monograph were completed and approved by the Study Group. The Institute of Pacific Relations suggested that these four chapters would make a very useful interim research report and that it would be worth while to have it distributed as a mimeographed supplementary paper for the XII I.P.R. Conference to be held in Japan

in 1954. The four chapters were factually brought up-to-date and sent to the Institute as a data paper.

It was not possible to complete the remaining parts of the study before the end of the year. A qualified technical assistant has been appointed since to complete the drafts of the remaining chapters.

India and her Neighbours Series

- 4. India and Burma: This monograph by Prof. W. S. Desai is in the press; it is hoped to have it published in May 1954.
- 5. India and Malaya: This monograph by Sri N. Raghavan is expected to be published in March 1954.
- 6. India and Ceylon: This monograph by Sri P. R. Ramachandra Rao is also expected to be published in March 1954.

Studies on India

- 7. India's Economic Relations with Far Eastern and Pacific countries, 1900-1952: This work dealing primarily with the development of trade relations with Far Eastern and Pacific countries during the first half of the present century has been completed and negotiations with Publishers are in progress regarding the publication of the monograph. The study covers in addition to China and Japan, British colonies of the region, Thailand and non-British colonies, Canada and the U.S.A. The post-war problems of trade have been especially discussed in the light of contemporary political and economic developments in India and in other countries of the region. In addition to an analysis of trade trends, the work contains a study of migration and capital movements.
- 8. The Foundations of India's Foreign Policy: This is a documentend study of the beginnings of India's Foreign Policy in Central Asia and its developments up to the year 1882. The monograph is in the press. Probable date of publication is July 1954.
- 9. Post-war Agricultural Problems and Policies in India: The study, prepared for the Institute of Pacific Relations, at the request of the Secretary-General of the Council, by the Research Staff of the Indian Society of Agricultural Economics, has been completed and sent to the Institute. Arrangements have now been completed for its publication in India by the Indian Society of Agricultural Economics in co-operation with the Institute of Pacific Relations. Probable date of publication is February 1954.
- 10. Public Administration in India: The publication of this monograph by Sri A. D. Gorwala has been delayed by reason of the many avocations which Sri Gorwala was in public interest compelled

to undertake. The manuscript is now nearly complete; additional matter relating to recent developments in public administration in India is now being added and it is hoped that we may be able to send it to the press by 30 June 1954.

- 11. India and the Commonwealth: Dr. B. N. Ganguli and Dr. A. Appadorai have agreed to write a monograph for the Council on 'India and the Commonwealth'. The preliminary chapter headings are as follows:

 - II. Political aspects:
 - 1. Citizenship in the Commonwealth.
 - 2. Foreign Policy: Points of Agreement with members of the Commonwealth.
 - 3. Foreign policy: Points of difference with the approach of individual members to international issues. Britain, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Ceylon, Pakistan.
 - 4. India's relations with members of the Commonwealth.
 - 5. Status of citizens of Indian origin in the Commonwealth countries.

III. Strategic aspects:

- 1. The defence of the Commonwealth.
- 2. Regional Security.
 - 3. Problems in Co-operation.

IV. Economic aspects:

- 1. Trade relations.
- 2. Problems of payment: The Sterling and the Dollar.
- 3. Investment—Commonwealth Finance Corporation.
- 4. Economic and financial self-help and mutual aid with special reference to the Colombo Plan.
- 5. Immigration Policy.
- V. Machinery for consultation and co-operation.
- V. Opportunities and prospects.
- 12. Transfer of Power from Britain to India and the Integration of States: Sri V. P. Menon, formerly Reforms Commissioner in India for a long time and later Secretary and Adviser, Ministry

of States has undertaken to prepare for the Council these two monographs. These studies are being financed by the Rockefeller Foundation.

13. India and the United Nations: Sri K. P. Karunakaran, Research Associate of the Council, rejoined duty early in the year and took charge of the work as rapporteur to the Study Group on 'India and the United Nations'. During the year the Group met four times and discussed papers in regard to Dependent Peoples, the U.N. Structural and Organizational questions and Race Relations. Papers relating to the Pacific Settlement of international disputes and Enforcement Action and disarmament had been prepared by the end of the year; they were scheduled for discussion by the Group in February 1954. It is expected that the final draft of the volume will be ready by July 1954.

On the occasion of the Annual General Meeting held at Madras, a special Conference of Members was held on 18 and 19 April in order to discuss different aspects of India's attitude towards the U.N. The Conference was largely attended and the discussions therein were very useful in assessing public opinion on different aspects of our attitude to the problems discussed in the U.N.

DOCUMENTS AND INFORMATION

The first Volume in the series Select Documents on Asian Assairs was in the course of publication during the year. The preparation of Vol. II (East Asia)—1947-50 has been completed and the introductions to this volume are also ready. The manuscript is now being prepared for the press. The volume of documents relating to Pakistan, Ceylon and Nepal is also expected to be ready by the middle of 1954. Arrangements have been made for the preparation of India in World Assairs for the periods 1950-51 and 1952-53 respectively by Professor M. Venkatarangaiya (Retired Professor of Politics, University of Bombay), and Professor S. V. Kogekar (Professor of Political Science, Fergusson College, Poona).

Towards the end of August, Sri S. L. Poplai, Director of Surveys and Documents, left on a round-the-world tour to collect documents and other materials needed for work in the Council and to make contacts to facilitate the regular supply of documents in future. His itinerary included visits, among other countries, to Lebanon, Syria, Egypt, France, the U.K., the United States, Japan, the Philippines, Indonesia, Malaya, Thailand and Burma. He is expected to be back by the end of February 1954.

In July Sri Vishal Singh was appointed as a temporary Research Assistant and was entrusted with work on Southeast Asia.

Press Library

During the year, 10 newspapers from Indonesia, the Philippines, Malaya, Syria, Pakistan and South Africa were added. More papers from West Asia (Middle East) and Southeast Asia are expected in 1954 as a result of Sri Poplai's tour. More attention is also now being paid to Africa and additional papers will be received from that region next year.

Documents

Besides newspapers, the Section started receiving during the year, the Information Bulletin, Middle East Weekly Review, Middle East Mirror, Al Khabour from Syria; Al Tahrir from Egypt; News Bulletin from Tunisia; Himalayan Times and Tibet Mirror from Kalimpong; and Congress News from Ceylon. Sri Poplai's tour will facilitate the receipt of many new journals and official reports and publications from West Asia and Southeast Asia in 1954.

Information Service

During the course of the year 120 enquiries were received. Some of them are mentioned below:

MEETINGS AND DISCUSSIONS

The holding of meetings and discussion groups continued to be an important activity of the Council. Fortynine meetings were arranged under the auspices of the Council at New Delhi besides several meetings at the various branch centres. A list of these meetings is given at Appendix III. Mr. Clement Attlee, Madame Alva Myrdal, Dr. Gunnar Myrdal, Sri V. K. Krishna Menon, Dr. Ralph Bunche, Srimathi Vijayalakshmi Pandit, Dr. Joseph E. Johnson, Sardar K. M. Panikkar, Viscount Swinton and Dr. Cheddi Jagan were among the distinguished scholars and statesmen who addressed meetings of the Council during the year. Of the subjects discussed under the auspices of the Council at New Delhi during the year, thirtytwo relate to international political affairs, nine of them to economic affairs, three to U.N. affairs and the rest to other subjects. Seven of these meetings relate to Far Eastern affairs, one to Southeast Asia, five to the Middle East and Africa each, and the rest to other regions and countries.

Staff: Sri B. C. Tiwari was granted leave by the Council to join the Department of Library Science of the Delhi University Library to qualify himself for the Diploma in Librarianship. Sri K. Srikantan was specially appointed to the United Nations Section of the Library to arrange documents of the United Nations and its Specialized Agencies. He is expected to complete the work by March 1954. Sri Girja Kumar, Librarian, attended the 10th All-India Library Conference held at Hyderabad from I to 4 June. Sri Kumar and Sri A. K. Bhatnagar, Assistant Information Officer of the Council jointly contributed a paper for discussion at the Conference on 'International Relations' and it was published in the symposium Depth Classification and Reference Service and Reference Materials. The Librarian and his staff prepared for the UNESCO (on behalf of the Asian Relations Organization) a Specimen Bibliography of Social Sciences for India, covering the second semester 1951, and containing the complete English production in the field of Social Sciences.

The Institute of Pacific Relations, New York, has been good enough to present a large number of back files of periodicals and Year Books which, among others, include the following: Current Notes on International Affairs; Foreign Policy Reports; International Affairs; New York Times Index; The Economist. Our thanks are due to Mr. W. L. Holland, Secretary-General, and Miss Mary F. Healy, Publications Secretary, of the Institute for this gift.

Sardar Gurmukh Nihal Singh, Speaker of the Delhi State Legislative Assembly and member of the Executive Committee of the Council, has kindly agreed to present his personal library of nearly 700 books to us at a later date. The collection consists of books on Political Science and International Relations.

Several sets of publications were received as gifts from various sources and among those whom the Council wishes to specially thank are: The U.K. High Commissioner in India, New Delhi; British National Book Centre, New Delhi; Representative, the British Council, New Delhi; League of Arab States, Cairo; Foreign Policy Association, New York; World Peace Foundation, Boston; The American Embassy, New Delhi; The Secretariat of the Council of Europe, Strasbourg; The Round Table, London; and Sri W. S. Barlingay, M.P., New Delhi. Most of the foreign embassies in India have been good enough to extend their co-operation to us as usual.

H.E. Dr. Mari Graessli, Minister for Switzerland in India prebented to the Council 92 books at an informal ceremony at the Swiss Legation on 30 April. This collection is the Swiss Government's contribution towards the new SAPRU HOUSE Library. Our thanks are due to the Swiss Minister for the valuable gift.

PUBLICATIONS

MONOGRAPHS: Economic Problems of underdeveloped Countries in Asia—A symposium.

This monograph published during the year contains articles by leading economists on different aspects of the economic problems of underdeveloped countries in Asia. These articles originally appeared in *India Quarterly* Volume VIII Nos. 2, 3 and 4.

India Quarterly: Four issues of the quarterly were issued as usual during the year (Volume IX Nos. 1 to 4). A list of the articles published in the journal is given at Appendix I.

Foreign Affairs Reports: Twelve issues of the Peports were published during the year. A list of the articles is given at Appendix II.

RELATIONS WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

The United Nations: The Council continued to enjoy consultative status with the United Nations Economic and Social

Council, in view of which the Council was frequently in correspondence with the United Nations Secretariat, the Specialized Agencies of the United Nations as well as the local United Nations Information Centre. The Council was represented by Sri S. L. Poplai, Director of Surveys and Documents and Sri M. S. Rajan. Administrative Secretary, at a Conference of non-Governmental Organizations in India convened by the United Nations Information Centre at New Delhi in order to consider arrangements for the celebration of the U. N. Day in India. Sri Rajan was nominated by the conference as a member of the Continuing Committee of non-Governmental Organizations for the purpose, in which capacity he attended some meetings of the Committee in order to finalize arrangements for celebrating the U.N. Day. The Council was also invited by the Ministry of External Affairs to send a representative to the 'All-India Committee for U.N. Day' constituted by them. Sri Rajan and Sri Devendra Nath, Assistant Secretary of the Council, attended meetings of the Committee on behalf of the Council. Srimathi Vijayalakshmi Pandit was elected Chairman of the Committee which co-ordinated arrangements all over the country for the celebration of the U.N. Day. Some of the branches of the Council were among the institutions which organized U.N. Day celebration.

Dr. A. Appadorai, Secretary-General of the Council, served as a member of the Indian National Jury for the U.N. Essay Contest.

During the year, Sri C. R. Sundaram, a member of the Council residing in New York, was accredited as the Council's representative to the Secretariat of the U.N. Economic and Social Council. In this capacity, he was invited to participate in a number of committees and conferences, including meetings of the General Assembly and Security Council. Sri Sundaram also represented the Council in the Conference of Consultative non-Governmental Organizations with its offices in New York and Geneva. He was an active member of the Conference and was elected as a Member-at-Large on the Bureau of the Conference, as also its Associate Treasurer. Among the matters discussed by the Conference and its Bureau the most important was a proposal to organize an International Organization Centre at the U.N. Headquarters for the service of representatives of non-Governmental Organizations holding consultative status with the Economic and Social Council.

The ECOSOC Secretariat consulted the Council on various matters during the year including the following: 'Co-ordination of work of non-Governmental Organizations active in the field of

Eradicating Prejudice and Discrimination' and 'Extent of Slavery and Forced Labour in India'. On the latter subject, the Council submitted a note to the ECOSOC Secretariat at its request.

During the year, the Council received many invitations for sending observers from the Economic Commission for Asia and the Far East, Bangkok and other subsidiary organs of the United Nations.

Dr. Appadorai visited Paris in November on his way back from the United States in order to meet especially the Director-General of the UNESCO and other UNESCO Officials to seek their co-operation in the work of the Council.

Srimathi B. Tarabai, Directress of the Lady Irwin College, New Delhi, continued to be the Council's representative on the Indian National Commission for Co-operation with the UNESCO.

Institute of Pacific Relations: The Council continued to cooperate with the Institute of Pacific Relations, New York as its National Council in India. As before, we exchanged our publications with those of the IPR. The IPR also assisted the Council in various ways particularly in the matter of acquisition of books and documents as well as by securing articles for *India Quarterly* and the *Foreign Affairs Reports*. The Council reciprocated these services to the IPR and participated in its Research Programme.

The Secretary-General of the Council, Dr. A. Appadorai and Sri S. L. Poplai, Director, Surveys and Documents, represented the Council at a meeting of the Pacific Council of the IPR on 17 and 18 October, held in New York.

Prof. D. R. Gadgil, Director, Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics, Poona, continued to be the Council's representative on the Pacific Council.

The Council continued to carry out certain research projects mentioned earlier on behalf of the IPR. The Council was also in touch with the other National Councils of the IPR, in particular those in Japan, Pakistan, Hawaii, Canada, The United States, Australia and South Africa.

The Royal Institute of International Affairs: Dr. A. Appadorai as well as Sri S. L. Poplai visited Chatham House during the year and had useful discussions with the officers of the Royal Institute of International Affairs on problems of mutual interest. Some members of the Council as well as those of the Royal Institute took advantage during the year of the reciprocal privileges afforded to them under an agreement between the two institutions.

During the year, the Council was in correspondence with the authorities of the Royal Institute in regard to the holding of the Fifth Commonwealth Relations Conference, 1954. Dr. A. Appadorai attended the second session of the Committee on Arrangements and Agenda of the Conference held at New York on 16 October, when it was decided to hold the Fifth Conference at Lahore in March 1954.

Carnegie Endowment for International Peace: As stated in last year's report, the Council has undertaken to prepare a volume on India's attitude towards the U.N. as part of an international research project on 'National Attitudes towards the United Nations' sponsored by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. As stated earlier in this report, considerable progress has been made in the completion of this project. During the year the Council was frequently in correspondence with the Endowment in regard to the project. We had also the pleasure of receiving in the month of February, Dr. Joseph E. Johnson, President of the Endowment when we signed an agreement with the Endowment in regard to the financing of the project. Dr. Johnson attended the first meeting of the Study Group, and explained to the Group the main features of the international research project.

During the year, the Council was invited by the Carnegie Endowment to send representatives to a Conference of Leaders of Institutes of World Affairs all over the world in order to discuss problems of co-ordination and to exchange ideas regarding the work of these institutions. With the financial assistance of the Carnegie Endowment, the Council was able to send as its representatives, Dr. Appadorai as well as Sri S. L. Poplai to the Conference which was held in New York from 19 to 31 October. At the invitation of the authorities of the Endowment, Dr. Appadorai read a paper on 'Institutes' Financial Policies and Problems' and Sri S. L. Poplai read a paper on 'Library and Documentation'; these were very much appreciated by the Conference.

Other Institutions: During the year, the Council was in touch with several other institutions abroad, some of which Sri S. L. Poplai personally visited in a round-the-world trip. The most important of these are: the International Institute of Administrative Sciences, Brussells (the Institute also unanimously elected Dr. Appadorai as a member); International Commission of Jurists, Berlin; World Federation of United Nations Associations, Geneva; International Political Science Association, Paris; University of Harvard, U.S.A.;

Institut Fur Europaische Politik Und Wirtschaft, Frankfurt a.M. and Institut Universitaire De Hautes Etudes Internationales, Geneva. The Council had the pleasure of receiving in June, Mr. Walter H. Mallory, Eexecutive Director of the Council on Foreign Relations, New York and discussing with him, among other things, a joint research project on 'Indo-American Relations'.

Organizations in India

As in previous years, the Council was in close touch, both by correspondence and otherwise, with the activities of, and co-operated with, several academic and research organizations in India. The Council was represented by Sri M. S. Rajan, Administrative Secretary of the Council, at the XVI Indian Political Science Conference held at Sagar (M.P.) in December. Dr. Appadorai was nominated by the Indian Political Science Association to survey 'Problems arising for newly independent states out of their participation in the work of the United Nations and its Specialized Agencies'. Dr. Appadorai continued to be the Council's representative on the Indian Council for Cultural Relations. He was also a member of the International Law Association, Indian branch. He continued to be the Joint General Secretary of the Asian Relations Organization and kept up his part-time honorary teaching work at the Delhi University. Among the other institutions with which the Council had dealings during the year are the Delhi School of Economics, the Bombay School of Economics, the Gokhale Institute of Economics and Politics, Poona and the Indian Society of Agricultural Economics, Bombay.

SAPRU HOUSE

The construction of the building which started in December 1952 had, by the end of the year, made substantial progress: the basement and the ground floor of the building had almost been completed; and the first floor, containing the auditorium, conference and committee rooms and administrative offices, it is expected, will be completed in about six months time. It is hoped that the entire building will be ready for occupation by September 1954.

On 31 December 1953, a sum of Rs. 4,70,475-12-9 had been collected for the building fund. A sum of Rs. 3,17,706-5-9 had been spent on this account upto 31 December 1953. The balance lying to the credit of the fund was Rs. 1,52,769-7-0.

In order to complete the construction of the building and also to Turnish it appropriately, we still need to collect at least Rs. 3,25,000 more. The Committee desires to renew its appeal to Members to assist it in order to raise these additional funds, so

that the Library and Offices of the Council may definitely move into the building according to present plans by September 1954.

THE BRANCHES OF THE COUNCIL

General

At the beginning of the year there were 24 branches of the Council at the following places: Ahmedabad, Allahabad, Amritsar, Bangalore, Baroda, Bhavnagar, Bombay, Calcutta, Cuttack, Gwalior, Hyderabad, Jaipur, Kanpur, Lucknow, Madras, Nagpur, Patna, Poona, Porbandar, Rajkot, Sagar, Simla, Trivandrum and Waltair. During the course of the year new branches were established at Banaras and Gauhati and the branch at Porbandar was closed. At the close of the year, therefore, there were 25 branches. 
