
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# Preface

The Summer Institute of Linguistics, at the time this bibliography goes to press, has under way research in some 300 languages. In general, these represent tribal vernaculars of small groups. The governments in the areas where these are found wish to record their cultural traditions, legends, and songs before it is too late--the groups are disappearing fast--and integrate their members with the national culture.

The Institute cooperates in these endeavors. The bibliography reflects both the technical recording of language or culture description and material for pedagogical aid in cultural transition. Work has thus far been published concerning 214 of these groups; preliminary material for many of the others are in manuscript files of the various governmental agencies concerned.

The Institute feels obligated, however, to serve on a wider front than that which technical knowledge by itself can provide. It operates within a framework of a concept of total man--intellectual, physical, spiritual. It cooperates with various governmental agencies in small-scale agricultural projects, for example, to contribute toward the economic welfare of these peoples. On the moral front, it tries to bring to bear its technical competencies by cooperating with the Wycliffe Bible Translators, who are working toward giving the vernacular groups parts of the Bible in their own language. It is believed that nonsectarian versions of this Book are the single most potent force which can be made available to give to these folk access to values and power for living which have infused our own western civilization for good.

The Institute accomplishes its aim through a permanent staff of some 1,300 members abroad, currently drawn from the USA, Canada, Great Britain, Australia, Perú, México, Germany, Switzerland, New Zealand and Japan. Each member is responsible for his own financing, which comes from small gifts of friends interested in this type of service.

Its headquarters and administrative crew are based in Santa Ana, California; its executive head is the founder (1934) and general director, Dr. William Cameron Townsend. Field offices in México, Guatemala, Ecuador, Perú, Bolivia, Colombia, Brazil, The Philippines, Australia, New Guinea, Viet Nam, Ghana, and the USA and Alaska decentralize the administrative load.

Quality control of research output is under the jurisdiction of its hard professional core, including some twenty PhD's in linguistics. These academic leaders hold on-the-field seminars in which tentative research results of the membership are tested against prime data from informants, and processed for most effective development of ideas of theoretical import. They also help in summer sessions--from which the Institute derives its name--to

staff the six intensive training institutes at the Universities of Oklahoma, North Dakota, and Washington, and in Australia, England, and Germany.

Some account may be given here of the research attitudes and goals which underlie much of our work--although wide variation occurs, inasmuch as our academic leaders have taken their advanced training in places as widely separated as Cornell University and the University of California, the School of Oriental and African Studies, London, and The University of Sydney, Australia. Here I shall first emphasize the implication of these attitudes for the larger framework of interdisciplinary studies.

For many decades--or generations--the various disciplines have been drifting farther apart. It has been centuries since a synthesis of human knowledge has been possible under a single over-all view. The Institute, though concentrating on the linguistic task, is committed to an attempt to work toward the integration of knowledge. It hopes that its contribution to the human communication center medium--language--will help to stimulate the climate within which such a synthesis might well take place in the near future on a scale far deeper than one could now dare hope.

Through its linguistic work, the Summer Institute of Linguistics is trying to contribute to the understanding of the nature of man. What mankind is, and the personality structure into which any one individual may grow, is deeply conditioned by language. If, in imagination, we strip from man everything which comes from his language, we delete his ability to talk, with the related knowledge of writing. All of his libraries disappear. All understanding of education, morals, and religion--in the intense degree to which they are transmitted by language--evaporate. Without language one can say neither "I know," nor "I enjoy," nor "I worship." In studying the complexities of language, we may be led back to understand something of the ultimate categories through which man establishes contact with the world.

A number of assumptions underlie much of the recent theoretical work of the Institute:

(a) Any unit of human behavior--event, thing, or concept as seen by man--is a relevant, well-described unit in relation to him if and only if three conditions are met: (1) that its contrastive-identificational features are specified; (2) that its range of variation (with its physical manifestations) is given; and (3) that its appropriateness has been stated as to membership in a class, in a hierarchical temporal or spatial array, and in systemic placement.

(b) Many units of human behavior combine components both of form and also of meaning (or usefulness, fruitfulness, and so on). Through its formal component our theoretical framework treats units as amenable to scientific analysis; through its meaning component the theory threats units as relevant to human behavior.

(c) By itself, neither theory nor applied science can make the greatest contribution to knowledge and human welfare. The Institute has the broadest network of linguistic research being undertaken by any private Institute in the world today. It is from this broad base of work with 300 languages that its newest theoretical concepts are growing.

At the same time it is training over 500 students yearly in its summer

courses--but it cannot know, in advance, to which of some two thousand unstudied languages a student might choose to go. It has been necessary, therefore, for the Institute to prepare these students for entrance into any unknown language by teaching them general theoretical principles applicable to all. Such a challenge forced us to develop, also, useful practical techniques for applying such theories. From these our textbooks have developed. The rapid oscillation from theory to practice and from practice to theory has therefore become one of the most characteristic attributes of the Institute.

Some years ago I found by trial and error that I could not aid in the development of a linguistic model with high enough generality to work for these languages unless at the same time it implied something about the nature of units of the nonverbal culture as well. Cultural anthropology, psychology, and even the nature of knowledge itself were involved. Since this material<sup>1</sup> began to appear there have been numerous evidences that it will be able to be in part integrated with or learn from certain approaches of other disciplines.

Once a person has stipulated that well-described units involve the manner in which the actors of that system respond to them, some correlation between psychology and linguistics is demanded. The Institute has begun some of these studies. When nonliterate peoples begin to learn to read,<sup>2</sup> for example, the clash of the graphic system with the spoken system helps reveal built-in biases of the spoken one. Such material should have immediate relevance to broad approaches to psycholinguistics which have been summarized by C. Osgood and Thomas A. Sebeok.<sup>3</sup>

The relation of mathematics to linguistics has become increasingly investigated in the last decade. The Institute has been interested here at several points. One of our scholars, Joseph Grimes, has been involved in developing a mathematical approach to language divergence, expressed in degrees of phonological difference.<sup>4</sup> Lexicostatistical dating has also been treated by our members.<sup>5</sup> My own work has included an attempt to take some basic mathematical notions such as matrix, and apply these to the development of a new kind of mathematics developed specifically for linguistics which will help in the search for pattern amidst apparently chaotic elements. By matrix permutation and conflation, the field structure of extremely complicated data is beginning to appear.<sup>6</sup>

Scholars with other academic affiliations have gone further with some

of these concepts. A most exciting recent development has been the attempt by Philip Bock (University of New Mexico) to start from some of our tagmemic concepts and develop various space-time-role matrices which show the structure of the activity of an entire community in its various aspects of ritual and nonritual activity.<sup>7</sup> Similarly gratifying is the work of Alan Dundes (University of California, Berkeley)<sup>8</sup> who has utilized some components of tagmemic theory in structural approaches to the analysis of folktales. This kind of material promises to be of great interest in understanding techniques by which human behavior among primitive peoples has developed such tales and in turn is in part controlled by them. Many of our members have been collecting various varieties of oral literature including not only native legends, but native folksongs, also, for some time. It is hoped that with the structural material of Dundes, and other approaches made possible by new technology,<sup>9</sup> that a good bit will eventually be found out about the integration of language study on the sentence level with written literature and hence eventually with literary criticism. Already attempts<sup>10</sup> have been made to bring to bear on literary criticism some studies of intonation (in which the Institute was a pioneer in a structural approach<sup>11</sup>). In such literary analysis the Institute has played only a very modest part, but looks forward to a greater contribution.<sup>12</sup>

As for writing--as over against literary analysis--the problem of English composition has for a long time plagued our country. Writing has appeared to be easy, but in fact the training of people to write clearly has been difficult. Recently I have attempted to bring to bear tagmemic theory on this problem. I started with the assumption that written language is sufficiently different from spoken language that it might, for these purposes, be called a "foreign language". From this assumption flow the consequences that some of the techniques of foreign language teaching might conceivably be brought to bear on the teaching of English composition. I just attempted, therefore, in a recent paper<sup>13</sup> to explore the possible usefulness of some of the techniques with which we have been training our people in the Institute for learning all kinds of unwritten languages.

Current philosophical debate involves repeated reference to language

matters. Here, also, the theoretical materials of the Institute have been brought to bear to try to clarify some problems in the relationship between truth and ambiguity.<sup>14</sup> Neither philosopher nor theologian can remain untouched by any theory of language which, growing out of a broad empirical base, brings to specific formulation deep-seated characteristics of language structure.

Any discovery of underlying theoretical principles about language structure should have some relevance to the teaching and the learning of the more widely-spoken languages. Here, again, we have made some modest attempt in the Institute to deal with these problems.<sup>15</sup>

### Development and Outlook

We turn now from interdisciplinary matters to specific development of theory and technique in linguistics proper.

**Phonology:** The Institute's earlier theoretical attempts at phonetic analysis involved development<sup>16</sup> of a theory to explain how a continuous sequence of sounds could be perceptually broken into segments. Over six dozen articles on the analysis of the sound systems of various languages have been published by the authors of our Institute.<sup>17</sup>

More recently we have attempted to deal with segments of sound much larger than--say--"b" or "o". Rather, we have attempted to exhaust the kinds of ways in which a string of syllables can be cut up into accentual groups (i.e., rhythm units,<sup>18</sup> or feet). Various of our members have been publishing materials along this line.<sup>19</sup>

**Lexicon:** The Institute hopes to turn out dictionaries for the various languages where it is working. Some thirty-nine of these have been published thus far.

Important studies of semantics through structural techniques have appeared recently. Among these are the work of Harold C. Conklin (of Columbia University);<sup>20</sup> of Charles O. Frake (of the University of California at Berkeley);<sup>21</sup> of Eugene A. Nida (of the American Bible Society);<sup>22</sup> and of J. J. Katz and J. Fodor (of M. I. T.).<sup>23</sup> Here, again, our members<sup>24</sup> are experimenting to see which approaches can illuminate our problems of linguistic analysis, and of translation theory as well. It appears probable, also, that our matrix theory (see fn. 6) will contribute to or merge with other approaches to the study of semantics.

**Grammar:** In the study of the way words are constructed, the Institute has made a substantial contribution. In the work of Doris Cox, for example,<sup>25</sup> the older technique of running together various kinds of verb patterns into a single composite chart has been replaced by the more efficient<sup>26</sup> separation of verb structural types (with their respective sequence types of morpheme classes), according to the occurrence of the total verbs in higher-level syntax positions.

The Institute is working with the assumption, however, that just as in some work of previous authors structural analyses were limited to word constructions, which led to results which had to be corrected and amplified by inclusion of sentence constructions, so now also some current<sup>27</sup> emphases on the sentence must be amplified by attention to constructions above the sentence. Our tagmemic theory includes as a basic component of the definition of any and every unit a distributional component in higher-level sequence, class, and matrix. It therefore requires that analysis of sentences not stop with the sentence itself but that their description be made in reference to still larger patterns. This emphasis is leading to various kinds of study of paragraph and discourse structure.<sup>28</sup>

It is hoped that the many studies of clause and sentence structure

(within the context of larger discourse) which are now under way will in the next decade give us the basic data necessary for some member of the Institute to develop an etics of clause structure, comparable to the exhaustive treatment of types of sounds (see fn. 16). Once such typologies of the phrase, of the clause, of the sentence are available, training for syntax analysis at these levels should be greatly speeded up. It is difficult for those of us who remember the situation twenty years ago--when "nobody knew how to analyze syntax" from a synchronic point of view--to realize that today it has become a commonplace built into our Institute's courses.<sup>29</sup>

The research outlook for the Institute is bright. Work has been under way extensively for some time in North and South America, New Guinea, and the Philippines, and with smaller research crews in Australia, and Viet Nam. In order to get a wider spread of empirical data needed for theory testing, however, we look forward to research coming out of our newly-opened field in West Africa, and to the development of new research centers in other parts of Asia or the Pacific.

Certain of the books, especially the textbooks, are cited with a listing of reviews following. The reviews are listed with last name of author, abbreviation of journal, volume and page numbers, and date of publication.

Many of the literacy items were put out in small experimental editions and are no longer available; those which are available may be obtained from the field addresses. Reprints of a few of the articles, especially the more recent ones, are also available from field offices or from the U.S. address.

Some of the authors whose works are cited here are no longer members of our field team. These are indicated with an asterisk. Their works have been included, however, since they are the results of their field research under our auspices. Deceased members are indicated by a cross.

The bibliographer of the Summer Institute of Linguistics is Dr. Viola Waterhouse, who is responsible for assembling the material here. The production of the bibliography in this format, however, is the work of our computer group, headed by Dr. Joseph Grimes (with John Alsop and others associated with him). The programming was prepared by them, and produced on the IBM 1410 and IBM 1620 systems at the University of Oklahoma, through the courtesy of the University Computer Laboratory there. This pioneering attempt at bibliographical programming is one of several programs under development--including, for example, a concordance routine for rapid assembly of lexical items, abstracted from text, for dictionary preparation.

In many instances the basic data behind the published papers could only have been collected under agreement with the governments of the countries involved. 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
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
