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Board of Trustees presents herewith its Annual Report for the year 1965-66 which gives a review of the administration and activities of the Indian Museum during the year together with relevant information regarding the constitution of the Board of Trustees and its various Committees.

The administration of the Indian Museum is run in accordance with the Indian Museum Act of 1910 (as amended upto 1960) and by the Bye-laws (as revised in 1961) made under the Act. The Indian Museum Rules are still in draft stage.

The Indian Museum is comprised of six cultural and scientific Sections with a number of galleries under each viz., Art, Archaeology, Anthro pology, Geology, Zoology and Industry (Economic Botany), where large collections of rare and unique objects, both Indian and trans-Indian. relating to art, humanities and the sciences, are exhibited. Besides, there are large reserve collections under each category, all of which are in the process of being arranged into visible study collection. Of the galleries relating to the six Sections, those pertaining to the three viz. Art. Archaeology and Anthropology, are directly under the administration of the Indian Museum Directorate. The remaining three Sections and their galleries-Geology, Zoology and Industry (Economic Botany)-are under the administrative control of the Geological Survey, Zoological Survey and Botanical Survey, respectively. In addition to the galleries of the three Sections the Indian Museum Directorate has four coordinating service units viz., Publication, Presentation, Photography and Preservation Units; it has also a central Library, and an Educational Services unit with Guide-Lecturers, which contribute to desired coordination in making this museum a real centre of visual education with improved display, higher research and service to public.

#### Obituary

#### New members

# Staff

During the period under review, significant changes in the staff position of the Indian Museum Directorate was witnessed due to integration of the Anthropological and Archaeological Galleries along with their curatorial staff with the Central Museum Directorate. Besides, a few appointments were made both in ministerial and technical wings in the vacancies caused during the year, notable among them, being the appointment of the Curator for the Anthropological galleries. In addition, during the year, services of the Caretaker and the Medical officer both of whom attained the age of superannuation were extended by another year. Re-employment for a period of one year was also given to the Gallery Assistant (Archaeology).

The staff of the Geological, Zoological and Industrial (Economic Botany) Sections were under the administrative control of their respective Surveys.

The staff of the Art Section since 23rd March, 1965 and those of the Archaeological and Anthropological Sections from 1.9.65 & 8.9.65 respectively were integrated with the administration of the Indian Museum Directorate on integration of the respective galleries and their collections.

## Finance

# **Activities of the Indian Museum**

The financial year 1965-66 was spent in implementing schemes and measures adopted for improvement of existing galleries and opening of a few new ones. Different arrangements and renovation were made in the Indian Museum for making it more attractive to the visitors as well as enabling it to function as a major centre for visual education. Some of the salient activities of the Indian Museum during the year under report in this regard are as follows:—

# Administrative reforms

#### Introduction of new rules

New rules were formulated for the effective administration of different branches of the Museum as well as for offering study facilities to the scholars and students and also for the benefit of the staff of this Museum.

# Benefit of staff

During the period under review, a four-member Sub-Committee, appointed by the Trustees, framed rules for Recruitment and other terms and conditions of service and also for offering benefits to the staff such as Provident Fund etc., under the Board of Trustees. The draft rules framed by the Sub-Committee was under the active consideration of the Board. Rules were also formulated for the treatment of the staff at the dispensary of the Indian Museum.

# Benefit of the visitors

To offer study facilities to scholars and students in the galleries, new rules were framed by another Sub-Committee appointed by the Board for the purpose. New rules were also framed for giving permission to take photographs of the exhibits as well as for the use of the Guest Room of this Museum.

The clause under Bye-law 29 was amended. By this amendment, children under 12 years of age were exempted from paying the usual entryfee on Fridays.

# Miscellaneous

Further administrative reforms were also made by delegating to the Director certain financial powers for the sanction of estimates etc., and also by appointing him a member-secretary of the Selection Committee for the recruitment of staff in the Indian Museum Directorate. The post of Director was made permanent by the Government of India and sanction was received from them making as many as 29 technical and 5 ministerial posts also permanent.

# Integration

Under the scheme formulated by the Ministry of Education, Archaeological and Anthropological galleries and collections which were so far manned by the respective Surveys were integrated with the Directorate of the Indian Museum with effect from the 1st and 8th September 1965, respectively. With the integration of these sections, considerable progress was made towards the establishment of a Central Directorate of Indian Museum and towards an all-round improvement in the different galleries of the museum thus put under its charge. A new gallery of Art—the Nahar Gallery of Oriental Art—was opened early in January of the year under review.

#### **Emergency measures**

During the national emergency arising out of the Indo-Pakistan conflict, adequate precautionary measures particularly against air-raids were adopted to protect the exhibits from all sorts of possible destructive agencies. Arrangements were also made to facilitate the staff to render their services as volunteers in the Civil Defence Organisation.

#### Museum Tank

The Indian Museum has a large tank on the southern side of the campus. The angling session remained closed during the period under review on account of the tank being declared as a "reserve" in connection with the national emergency due to Pakistan attack.

#### Loan of exhibits abroad

At the request of the Govt. of India, Ministry of Education, two sculptures of Indian Museum were given on loan for holding an Exhibition of Indian Art in Stuttgart and subsequently in Hamburg, West Germany. A new policy in regard to sending exhibits on loan for exhibition abroad was formulated. It was resolved that, in future, for sending exhibits of the Indian Museum abroad, prior permission of the Education Minister would be solicited and special security measures would be taken.

# Acquisition of new objects

To present the different styles of Indian Archaeology in different historical periods, seven sculptures were received on permanent loan from the Director General of Archaeology for the Indian Museum. Contact was established with different museums of India to enter into an exchange programme of exhibits. 561 coins belonging to different periods of Indian history were also acquired through gift and purchase. 24 specimens of rocks and minerals were received on loan for the Pre-history section from the Geological Survey of India. Three bronze figures, one terracotta head were also acquired through purchase for the Archaeological collection of the Museum. The Art collections were also enriched by the acquisition of Tibetan Thankas, paintings, manuscripts during the period under report.

#### **Guide Service and Visitors**

Persons of different age-groups from different strata of the society and from different parts of the country and abroad visited the Museum as usual during the period under report. Conducted tours of interested visitors by the six Guide-Lecturers, one for each section, were held twice daily, one in the morning and the other in the afternoon. The following two Tables show the number of persons visiting the Museum [Table 1] and the number of visitors who attended the lectures of the Guide-Lecturers [Table II] during the year:

# Development Programme

# A. Galleries and Collections

In the development programme of the Indian Museum, the Art Section received the most attention as being under the control of the Directorate for almost the whole of the period under review. A new gallery, the Nahar Gallery of Oriental Art, was set up with the Nahar Collection of art objects which were bequeathed to this Museum in 1927 and were lying dismantled at the time of the integration of the Art galleries with the Directorate. Completely renovated and re-set, the gallery now is a great attraction for visitors. Apart from the above, a new case for bronzes of the art collections and a new mode of display the shawl collections of the Section was installed in the galleries.

The undue congestion in the Painting gallery was relieved by the dismantling of the badly displayed Tibetan Thankas at the same place and the old panels were given a new colour background on a newly provided smooth face. The entire scheme of displaying the miniatures was further changed in the form of labelling.

The dismantled Tibetan Thankas are to be set up in a separate gallery as soon as adequate space is available.

For the reserve collection of the Art Section, a very good progress was made. All the valuable art objects, so long lying exposed to dust and other damages in the mezannine floor of the art galleries, were given an immediate protection by putting them under cover after a preliminary cleaning. The entire collection of reserve textiles were put in order, sorted out and preserved in cases which were prepared within a very short period.

Services of Sri Tinkari Mukherjee, former Deputy-Keeper of the Art Section, were requisitioned on re-employment basis in this connection.

A number of galleries on the archaeology and anthropology side were also immediately taken up for re-arrangement and improvement after they were integrated in September, 1965 with the Directorate. Within the seven months of the remaining period of the present review a completely

renovated new Bay of the long sculpture gallery was opened to the public. This displayed the renowned Amaravati sculptures in the collections of the Museum.

Almost all the sculptures that were received back after their exhibition in Japan and the U.S.A. were set up in the galleries in an improved style of display.

Further work for the improvement of the Gandhara bay of the sculpture gallery was taken up, by way of better colour-scheme and new window-cases along the wall.

The entire Epigraphy gallery along the long corridor of the 1st floor of the Main Museum Building was given a new and improved colour background and an improved system of labelling was taken in hand.

The work of setting up a new gallery for Musical instruments of the Anthropology collection was taken up immediately since the collection was integrated with the Museum Directorate. A selection of about 91 pieces was made and the gallery after proper renovation and lighting arrangements was almost ready by the end of the year under review.

Additional accessory labels for each tribe or provincial unit represented in the different dioramas of the Anthropology galleries were provided to make the presentation more understandable to the lay public and more useful for scholars.

The entire collection of the Anthropological objects in the reserve handed over in long-packed boxes was taken up for a scientific sorting and classification immediately after the integration. They have since been properly identified, arranged and labelled for study purposes and display in rotating exhibition in the galleries.

#### B. General

Efforts were made to utilise all-available space in the Main Museum Building to the best advantage of the Museum and its galleries and correspondence in this connection was also made with the Civil Defence Organisation to vacate the gallery space of the Museum occupied by them.

To make the Museum more attractive to the public, better illumination arrangement in general was made. A habitat group of **chital** (deer) in the Zoological gallery (Vertebrate) was a new addition to the section.

Museum plans, notice boards, indication boards, trilingual labels etc., were prepared and they were also placed at convenient places to serve better the educational purposes of the Museum.

# Popular lectures

During the year 1965-66, the Museum had the regular bi-annual feature of holding 12 popular lectures (illustrated with slides) to interest and enlighten the public in the different subjects covered by the Museum. A detailed programme of the lectures during the year under review, runs as follows:

#### Discussion Seminars

A series of monthly Discussion Seminars were arranged for the Curatorial Staff for inculcating a spirit of research and investigation among the technical staff of the Museum. At these seminars, papers were read and discussed for the ultimate object of publishing them in the Museum's Bulletin.

#### Children's Programme

The Children's Programme, a part of the general education programme of the Indian Museum, was started for the first time during the period under report. This programme was worked out in order to cater to the needs of the formative minds of our future generation. In this programme, contact was established with schools inviting them on every Saturday which was observed as "Children's Day." Organised batches of students were taken round the galleries and educational films were shown to them. In this programme, altogether 1561 students from 36 schools participated and 39 educational films were shown.

#### **Educational Film-Shows**

In collaboration with the different sections of the Indian Museum, British Information Service and United States Information Service from whom the films were received on loan, under the Children's Programme, film-shows were arranged on every Saturday observed as Children's Day.

#### Exhibition

This Museum organised a photographic exhibition on "Museums in Education" sponsored by the British Council, accompanied by educational

film-shows. Necessary facilities were extended to the Indian College of Arts, Calcutta, to organise its exhibition of paintings on the premises of the Indian Museum.

# Educational facilities extended to outsiders

Facilities were extended to the different Surveys of the Govt. of India and other institutions and associations for holding their seminars and lectures at the Lecture Theatre of the Museum. The Departments of Ancient Indian History & Culture, Museology, etc., of the Calcutta University held their classes in the Museum Galleries and the Coin Room. Necessary facilities were given to the out-station educational institutions to hold their classes in the Museum Galleries while on study tour. Art Students of different Art Schools and Colleges had the priviledge of making study and sketches in the Galleries.

A special Sub-Committee was appointed by the Trustees to frame rules for offering special study facilities to the students and scholars. Rules were also formulated in regard to the supply of photographs, models, etc., on demand and also for taking photographs of the Museum exhibits and their subsequent reproduction, if any. Large number of photographs of exhibits of the Indian Museum were supplied to scholars both at home and abroad on demand. Coins were also identified for outsiders on request. Library facilities were also provided to students and scholars. New publications were brought out and work of photo-library was started.

#### **Preservation Unit**

A proposal was made for setting up of a Preservation Unit for the chemical preservation and treatment of the Museum's vast collection of rare and invaluable material, under a competent Chemist. In order to have a qualified and experienced hand, the proposed post of Chemical Assistant was up-graded to that of Assistant Chemist. Recruitment of other staff for the Unit, like Laboratory Assistant, Laboratory Attendant, etc., a definite shape to this Unit was given during the year under report.

#### Medical Unit

The part-time Medical officer of the Medical Unit of the Indian Museum took precautionary measures to check epidemic diseases like Cholera, Small-pox, etc., among the staff of the Indian Museum. During the year under report, 1294 cases were treated in the Museum dispensary.

Class IV Staff living in the staff quarters within the museum compound were specially attended to.

During this year, about 250 copies of different publications were sent on exchange to different museums and also presented to reputed allied institutions of the country and abroad and to persons of eminence.

Rs. 1,615.72 were collected during the year as sale-proceeds for publications.

During the period under review, the Photography Unit, one of the co-ordinating service units of the Indian Museum, made a laudable output by meeting the needs for photographs, transparencies etc., for multifarious departmental use, such as publication, documentation, display, etc. In addition to black and white, coloured slides were also prepared in the processing laboratory of this unit inspite of its limited resources. To meet the requests for photographs etc., from scholars and institutions, a large number of photographs of museum exhibits were prepared both from existing negatives and by making fresh negatives.

Service of this unit was also rendered to sister museums in Calcutta to get their photographic works done through it and a wide programme of photographic exchange with other leading museums was undertaken. Operation of audiovisual equipment in connection with popular lectures and Children's programmes was also entrusted with the staff of the unit.

The outstanding work of the unit for the period under report was to start forming a "Photo-library" with record photographs of the collection of this as well as other museums and similar institutions. For this purpose, tours to a few other museums of India were undertaken by the staff of the unit during this period.

# **Presentation Unit**

This Unit looked after the display and modelling works together with the preparation of materials of visual aids required for the museum galleries. As a co-ordinating service Unit, it also helped the Publication Unit by cover designs and line drawings required for its publications. It also served the galleries (Technical Units) by setting up the display works of two newly set up gelleries through providing short and descriptive trilingual labels, indication boards, maps, charts, etc., as a part of the larger scheme of educational services of the Museum.

Moulds and plaster-casts of coins and sculptures of the Museum's vast collections were prepared and supplied on sale to the public and different institutions like, the Banaras Hindu University, the Marathawada University, etc.

# Library

During the period under review, 189 books mainly on Art, Archaeology and Anthropology and 14 new Periodicals were added to the library by purchase. 45 books and 74 periodicals were received as gift and also on exchange. Library facilities were extended to the students and scholars on request. Purchase of specially designed furniture viz., reading tables, Periodical racks etc., met the immediate needs of the library. Arrangements were made to get the Periodicals and old books bound.

# Sectional Reports

# Archaeology

n lst September, 1965, the Archaeological galleries of the Indian Museum, so far run by the Museums' Branch of the Archaeological Survey of India were integrated along with curatorial staff, with the Indian Museum Directorate under the direction of the Ministry of Education, Government of India.

# Gallery works and other activities

Since the integration, the works of reorganisation and renovation were taken in hand for the improvement of the Sectional galleries. Under the modernisation scheme, background with suitable colour and improved lighting arrangements was provided to the Bhumara Bay, Mathura Bay, Mathura cases in the sculpture gallery. Ancient and medieval inscriptions gallery was also under re-arrangement with better background set-up and better labelling. The Amaravati Bay of the Sculpture gallery was re-fashioned and re-arranged with an artificial ceiling and fluorescent lighting. With a view to effecting a better and comprehensive display of the artistic tradition of Central India of the medieval times, the sculptures from Khajuraho were presented in a separate bay. The re-organisation work of the pre-historic collection in a newly renovated gallery was in progress.

# Acquisitions

During the period 1965-66, the Archaeological collection of the Indian Museum was enriched by the acquisition of three bronze images, one terracotta human head, and one sculpture (Vishnu, South India) by pur hase. Seven sculptures, five from Khajuraho (c. 10-11th century A. D.) and two from Sarnath (c. 7th Century A. D.) were acquired as on loan from the Director General of Archaeology in India. 561 coins of different metals belonging to the different periods of Indian History were also acquired. Some of the coins were purchased

and others were received as gift. In the Pre-historic section, 24 specimens of rocks and minerals were also received on loan from the Geological Survey of India.

# Anthropology

Under a scheme formulated by the Ministry of Education, to bring all the galleries under the Central Directorate of the Indian Museum, the Anthropological galleries of the Indian Museum, so far manned by the Anthropological Survey of India, were integrated with the Indian Museum Directorate on 8th September, 1965 along with its gallery staff.

During the period under review, extensive developmental works were taken in hand in this section. At the same time, verification of exhibits immediately after the integration was also taken up. The developmental schemes relate to:

Reorganisation of the reserve collection
Setting-up of the new Musical Instruments gallery
Introducing new descriptive labels in the existing galleries and dioramatic cases.

# Re-organisation of the reserve collection

With a view to utilising the reserve collection for periodical display and for organising temporary exhibitions, and also for their systematic maintenance, the works of re-organisation, systematisation, cataloguing and card-indexing of sectional reserve collections were taken in hand during this period.

# Setting-up of the new Musical Instruments gallery

During this period, arrangement of exhibits and proper lighting in the specially designed show-cases of the Musical Instruments Gallery, a new addition to this section, were completed.

# Introducing new labels in the existing gallery

For proper explanation and interpretation of the exhibits, particularly the habitat groups, to the visitors, the work of preparation of descriptive tri-lingual labels is in progress.

## Re-organisation Programme

During the period under review, a programme of re-organisation of the Art Section and its galleries was taken up. For bringing in variety of interest in these galleries, experiments were conducted on intellectually alive and visually varied exhibition and display by introducing rotating systems of presentation.

The Nahar gallery of Oriental Art, one of the galleries of the Art Section, which was closed for a few years, was thrown open to the public after thorough renovation and re-organisation on 3rd January, 1966.

In the modernisation works of the painting gallery, old screens were re-set in new arrangements with a new background and new labelling. All previous types of congested display were changed and the whole arrangement put on attractive basis.

#### Acquisition

During the year 1965-66, the collection of art objects was enriched by the acquisition of a number of interesting specimens, conspicuous among them were three Tibetan Thankas (17th-18th century A. D.), illustrated manuscripts of Kalakacharyya Katha (17th century A. D.) and Dasavaikalika Sutra (16th century A.D.), an illustrated palm-leaf manuscript in Newari script (14th century A. D.) and also a few miniature paintings of different schools.

# Zoology

Considerable improvement, re-organisation and development of the different Zoology galleries were made during the year under report, a brief account of which is furnished below:

# Re-organisation & development

A new addition to the large Mammal gallery during the year, is one chital (spotted deer) habitat case depicting a typical chital habitat

of Balaghat Forest Division, M. P. Most of the exhibits in this gallery were re-arranged. In the bird and reptile galleries, peacock, pea-fowl, gharial and crocodile were placed against newly set-up natural habitat background. Seventy seven spirit preserved exhibits and two hundred horns and heads of mammals were cleaned and re-conditioned. Twenty-five articulated skeletons of mammals, birds and reptiles were bleached, repaired and retouched. One hundred and forty three mounted exhibits were also retouched during this period.

New 19 trilingual labels for exhibits were written and 11 old labels were retouched.

The card cataloguing of the mammal exhibits of the gallery is in progress.

#### Addition

During the period under report, one mammal and fourteen different species of birds were added to the galleries.

#### **Publication**

Shri K. S. Pradhan, Superintending Zoologist, prepared a Guide-Book for the Zoology galleries of the Indian Museum and it was published by Indian Museum Directorate.

# Services rendered to public & educational institutions

In addition to affording study facilities to the visiting students, the School Loan Service Section helped colleges in organising their educational exhibitions by supplying specimens on loan. Technical help was also extended to the Film Division, Government of India, for a documentary film on Taxidermy and display of Zoological Specimens in Museums.

#### Staff

During the period under review, the Zoologist (formerly Curator) was in-charge of the Zoological galleries of the Indian Museum under the overall supervision of the Deputy Director and Director of the Zoological Survey of India.

# Geology

The Geology galleries of the Indian Museum, during the year under report, were re-organised considerably.

# Re-organisation

In the re-organisational work of the Geological galleries, a latest edition of the Geological Map of India was placed in the Meteorite Gallery replacing the old one. State-wise graphical representation of production of diamond and minerals and also the extent of earning of foreign exchange through those minerals from the year 1920 to 1964 were also presented in the gallery.

Foreign fossil collection in the Invertebrate gallery was re-organised. New plastic trays were introduced in place of old cardboard trays in the gallery.

37 new labels were added. 1107 existing labels were cleaned. 1087 labels were painted and also 339 were re-painted for the show-case drawers.

Cleaning, checking and complete re-arrangement of minerals were made in 23 show-cases.

Four specimens were added to the gallery collection. Arrangement was made in the gallery for special display of 20 mineral specimens obtained from U. S. S. R.

Plaster cast replicas of meteorite specimens were made.

#### Current news

The visitors of the Geology galleries were apprised with 105 items of current news like earthquakes, volcanoes, landslides, marine geology, oil geology, new finds of minerals, mountain expeditions, etc., by written information supplemented by diagramatic and coloured features.

#### Training

Four stipendiary scholars of the Government of India were given training in the Fossil gallery. Special assistance in study was also extended to fourteen geologists connected with different institutions of India.

Materials for the publication of the Guide-Book of the Geology galleries of the Indian Museum in Hindi were also prepared.

#### Staff

During the period under review, two Curators, assisted by Asstt. Geologists, Senior Technical Assistant, etc., looked after the galleries under the supervision of the Petrologist-in-Charge and the Palaeontologist-in-Charge and over-all guidance of the Director-General, Geological Survey of India.

# **Industry (Economic Botany)**

The Industrial Section of the Indian Museum itself mainly with the collections, preservation, maintenance and display of all plants and plant products, particularly to illustrate the vegetable wealth of India.

Shri K. S. Srinivasan, Curator of this section was transferred on promotion as Deputy Director of the Botanical Survey of India, but, at the same time, looked after the duties of the Curator of this section in addition to his own duties.

During the year under report, the staff of this section wrote altogether 8 papers some of which had already been published in the scientific journals.

#### Research projects

During 1965-66, the following were the important projects taken up for research work:

Economic aspect of Indian Sps. of Leguminoscae Monographic work on mangoes Economic aspects of the family euphorbiaccae Economic possibilities of Indian Oak Woods used in ship building

#### **Educational Services**

Authentic information was supplied on numerous economic plants and plant products, cultivation methods of several important commercial crops and distribution and availability of several species for commercial exploitation and the potentialities of new plants. During the period, several commercial firms and other organisations were the beneficiaries, and among them were National Pharmaceutical & Medical Service Pvt. Ltd., Kerala; M/s. United Chemical & Allied Products, Calcutta; M/s. Eastman Co., Calcutta; M/s. United Chemical and Allied Products, Calcutta; etc., and several other individuals attached to Government or Private Organisations. A large number of specimens were identified for outsiders on request. Scientific and vernacular names were also furnished on enquiry by different outside parties.

Separable objects like seeds, roots, etc., were supplied to different individuals and institutions on request for facilitating them in research works on those objects.

Sectional library facilities were extended to 50 outsiders from different walks of life.

#### Museum Work

A large number of exhibits were treated with preservatives. The old labels were replaced by 800 new ones. 70 black and white, 8 maps and 34 coloured illustrations were prepared.

#### Herbarium Work

A good number of herbarium sheets were cleaned, poisoned and treated with preservatives. Several hundred damaged sheets were replaced and remounted, where necessary. Many new collections were added.

#### Staff

The Curator assisted by an assistant Curator was in-charge of the section under the overall guidance of the Director, Botanical Survey of India.


