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PREFACE

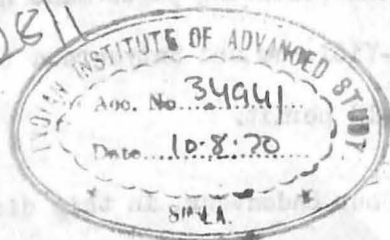
Entries are classified under several headings and they are all serially arranged.

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CHRONOLOGY OF GANDHIJI'S LIFE

- 1869 - 2nd October - Born at Porbunder.
- 1876 - Student - life Started at Rajkot, Betrothal with Kasturbai.
- 1883 - Married to Kasturbai.
- 1885 - Death of his Father.
- 1887 - Passed Matriculation Examination. Joined Shamaldas College, Bhavnagar.
- 1888 - 4th September : Started for London for further studies.
- 1889 - First Public Speech in the Vegetarian Society of England.
- 1891 - 10th June : Passed Bar-at-Law Examination; 7th July: Reached Bombay-News of Mother's death.
- 1892 - Practice at Rajkot and Bombay.
- 1893 - In April Left for South Africa to assist a case.
- 1894 - The case was settled through arbitration.
- 1895 - Became an advocate of the Natal Supreme Court; Started Natal Indian Congress.
- 1896 - Came to India for 6 months; Met Tilak, Gokhale and other leaders; Back to South Africa on 28th November.
- 1897 - Demonstration against him at Durban Port; great change in life.
- 1899 - Helped the British in Boer-War.
- 1901 - Came to India; Service in plague at Rajkot. Attended Calcutta Congress.

- 1902 - Toured Burma and India by third-class; Office at Bombay in July; Started again for South Africa after three months.
- 1903 - Transval British India Association & 'Indian Opinion' Started.
- 1904 - Read Gita and Ruskin's 'Unto This Last' - Revolutionary change in life. Established Phoenix Settlement.
- 1906 - Served the wounded in Zulu-Rebellion; Vow of celibacy (continence); coined the historic word 'Satyagraha' went to England as a member of the deputation.
- 1907 - Satyagraha against Asiatic Registration Act.
- 1908 - Interim Settlement; Attacked by Mir Alam; Started Satyagraha once again and arrested.
- 1909 - First letter to Tolstoy; Went to England in the Deputation, While returning wrote 'Hind Swaraj' on the Steamer.
- 1910 - Established Tolstoy Farm at Johannesburg.
- 1912 - Gokhale's visit to South Africa; published 'Nini-Dharma'; Wrote a book on 'General knowledge about Health.
- 1913 - Restarted Satyagraha; Arrested and released; Seven days' fast and one meal a day for four and a half months.
- 1914 - 'Fourteen-days' Fast; settlement and success of Satyagraha; Started for England on 18th June; First World War From 4th August; Acquainted With Sarojini Naidu and rendered service in the great War.
- 1915 - Returned to India; Received Kaiser I-Hind Medal; Tour of India; acquainted with Kaka Kalelkar and Acharya Kripalani; Gokhale's death on 19th February; Established Satyagraha Ashram in Ahmedabad at Kochrab on 25th May.

CHRONOLOGY

- 1916 - Famous speech on the occasion of the establishment of Benares University-Met Jawaharlal Nehru for the first time at Lucknow-Congress.
- 1917 - Met Rajendrababu for first time- Champaran-Satyagraha on 19th April Indentured system abolished on 31st May; Death of Dadabhai Naoroji on 30th June-Came in contact with Mahadevbhai Desai.
- 1918 - Textile-Mill-workers' strike at Ahmedabad; Fast for three days; Kheda Satyagraha-Revival of the Spinningwheel.
- 1919 - Rowlatt-Act; 6th April was observed as a protest day with prayer and fasting all over India-Jallianwala Bagh massacre on 13th April; started 'Young India' and 'Navajivan' Non-co-operation through Khilafat; Amritsar Congress.
- 1920 - 1st August-Death of Lokmanya Tilak; 2nd October Establishment of Tilak Swaraj Fund; Congress constitution prepared by Gandhiji was accepted; Started Non-Co-Operation Movement; Laid Foundation of Gujarat Vidyapith.
- 1921 - Other National Education Institutes started; Riots due to boycott of the Prince of Wales on his arrival and five days' fast; Ahmedabad-Congress.
- 1922 - 5th February; the tragedy of Chauri Chaura, Satyagraha withdrawn; Five days' fast; arrested on 10th March; punishment for six years.
- 1924 - Operated for Appendicitis; released on 5th February; 21 days' fast on 24th September for Hindu-Muslim unity; Presided over the Belgaum Congress.
- 1925 - 6th June: Death of Deshbandhu Chittaranandas; A weeks' fast; Cawnpore Congress; All India Spinners' Association established.

- 1926 - Martyrdom of Swami Shraddhananda.
- 1927 - Khadi Tour; Death of Hakim Ajmalkhan on 29th December.
- 1928 - Simon-Commission; Bardoli Satyagraha; 22nd April - Death of Maganlal Gandhi-Manager of Sabarmati Ashram; 17th November; Death of Lala Lajpatrai; Nehru Report; The Compromise worked out at Calcutta Congress Between its two wings.
- 1929 - Demand for complete Independence at Lahor Congress.
- 1930 - Independence Pledge on 26th January; 12th March- Dandi-March to protest against Salt-Tax; Arrested on 5th May.
- 1931 - 4th January: Death of Mr. Mohmed Ali in England; Released on 25th January; Death of Pandit Motilal Nehru on 6th February; Gandhi-Irwin Pact on 4th March; Bhagatsingh sent to gellows 24th March; Karachi-Congress; Martyrdom of Ganeshshankar Vidyarthi on 25th March; Participation in the second R.T.C. as a sole representative of India; Returned from the R.T.C. in December.
- 1932 - Congress declared illegal; Satyagraha started again; Arrested on 4th January; 'Young India' and 'Navajivan' weeklies stopped; Fast unto Death from 20th September against seperate electorate; Yarrowada Pact on 24th September; Fast ended on 26th September.
- 1933 - 21 days' fast from 8th May: Beginning of 'Harijan' weeklies Released and arrested again; Imprisonment for one year; Fast unto death from 16th August for a week; Released on 23rd August; Death of Annie Besant on 20th September. Death of Vithalbhai Patel on 22nd September; 1st August - disbanded Sabarmati Ashram; Decided to stay at Wardha; Harijan Tour from 7th November.

CHRONOLOGY

- 1934 - Earthquake in Bihar; Satyagraha stopped on 7th May; Fast for seven days; All India Village Industries Association Organized, Bombay Congress.

- 1935 - Golden Jubilee of Congress.

- 1936 - Death of Dr. Ansari on 10th May; Sevagram Ashram established.

- 1937 - Congress Ministry in July; Nai Talim (Basic Education) started.

- 1938 - Haripura Congress.

- 1939 - Maulana Shaukat Ali died on 4th January. Fast unto death at Rajkot-ended after four days at the intervention of the Viceroy. Tripuri Congress; Subhashchandra Bose resigned from the presidentship of Congress; Second world war started on 3rd September; provincial Congress Governments resigned on 8th November.

- 1940-41 Individual Satyagraha Started on 11th October - The first Satyagrahi was Vinoba; ban on Harijan papers.

- 1941 - Death of Rabindranath Tagore on 7th August; Left leadership of the Congress; Go-Seva-Sangha was established on 30th September.

- 1942 - Leadership of the Congress accepted again; Death of Sheth Jamanalal Bajaj on 11th February, Cripps; Mission; Organization of Hindustani Prachar Sabha, 'Quit India' Resolution on 8th August; Nationwide arrests of the leaders on 9th August. Death of Mahadevbhai Desai on 15th August.

- 1943 - 21 days' Fast in Aga Khan Palace.
- 1944 - Death of Kasturba Gandhi on 22nd February; Released from jail on 6th May; Gandhi-Jinnah Talks.
- 1945 - Release of leaders from the jail; First Simla Conference.
- 1946 - Cabinet Mission; Muslim League observed 'Direct Action' day on 16th August; Communal Riots; Foot-March of Noakhali started.
- 1947 - India gets Independence on 15th August; 73 days' fast at Calcutta.
- 1948 - Fast unto Death lasted for five days. Restoration of Peace at Delhi; Death on 30th January.

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
